

“What is the second key question—of the three questions—that every attorney must ask and answer before filing your accident lawsuit in court?”

In my last mailing to you, I explained that an accident lawsuit is like a three-legged stool that must not wobble. I told you that before filing a lawsuit in court, the first question that an attorney must ask and answer is, “Who is liable or responsible for the accident?”



The **second question that must be asked** gives us ← the second leg of our three-legged stool. The stool still cannot stand, but we're getting closer to a complete analysis of an accident case.

The second question is, **“Is there an injury?”** It is the injury or degree of harm done that lends value to a case.

An experienced personal injury attorney knows that a person can be really hurt in an accident, but that this must be proven, in court. A good attorney knows how to present a client's injuries so that a jury can see how that person's life has been changed for the worse. It's not enough to be hurt; a good attorney will help his or her client “prove the hurt.”

In an accident case, the **severity of the injury**, together with the **liability or responsibility** of other persons in causing physical harm, gives value to an accident lawsuit. But there is still one more question for the attorney to ask and answer.

In my next monthly mailing to you: The last question is asked; the third leg of the three-legged stool is added and the stool is complete and will not wobble. Then you will see the overall picture—how a personal injury attorney decides whether or not to proceed with your case.

The key ring I'm sending you is meant as a reminder that **these are “key” questions for an attorney to consider before starting your accident case in court.**
